The Board of Education of the Colton Joint Unified School District met in a Special Budget Workshop Session on Thursday, March 6, 2008, 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room at the CJUSD Student Services Center, 851 So. Mt. Vernon Avenue, Colton, California.

Call to Order

Board President Robert Armenta called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. Board member Mendoza-Ware led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America. On behalf of the Board, Kent Taylor acknowledged former Board member Ray Abril, Jr.

1. Budget Update:

Superintendent Downs provided an outline of the budget presentation that focuses on proposed reductions amounting to \$10.2 million dollars. Cabinet members, the Budget Committee, fiscal staff, and the Assistant Superintendent of Business have been working diligently to develop a plan to keep cuts away from the classroom and employees. He stated that concepts such as the golden handshake, reallocation of funding and a hiring freeze will assist with the crisis.

Assistant Superintendent Casey Cridelich clarified that the information published in the newspaper today did not accurately reflect the District's total ongoing necessary reduction of \$10,212,596 (\$4.6M in contractually increasing expenditures plus the loss of \$5.6M in ongoing revenues). The article specified only the \$5.6M in reduced revenue and staff later discovered that the \$4.6M in increased expenditures was left out of the news article after having given both amounts to the press. He provided a PowerPoint presentation that reflected updated information presented at the Special Meeting on February 4, 2008. He clarified that the figures are "projected" and assumptions have been made, however, actual figures will not be known until the State's May Budget Revise (in mid-May). The Base Revenue Limit per ADA for 2007-08 is \$5,793 (contains 4.53% COLA) compared to the projected 2008-09 rate of \$5,653 (contains 4.94% COLA less the 6.99% deficit factor) for a net loss of \$140 or 2.4% per ADA.



<u>Excerpts</u>: The second Interim Report is build upon assumptions relative to the Governor's 2008-09 budget proposal:

- \$10.2 million in ongoing reductions vs. just the \$5.6 million in ongoing revenue
- Ongoing structural imbalance of deficit spending that was being paid for on paper in future years with one-time funds (Funds 17 & 40), the June deferral and ongoing COLA
- 2008-09 enrollment and multi-year projections
- Proposed savings suggested by Cabinet, Budget Committee, Recap—Suggested Staff Reductions

2. Board members shared individual comments, concerns, and suggestions.

- Review all information before actual budget reductions are made as there may be limitations that would impact secondary programs and program improvement. Assistant Superintendent Yolanda Cabrera explained the program improvement process and stated that a DAIT team will assist with the alignment of the nine Essential Program Components (EPCs).
- Regarding the Golden handshake: projected savings, restrictions; check credentials; re-check the numbers for average costs of salary; how would the Curriculum Department function post golden handshake?
- Over the last couple of years, how many students were enrolled and the number of teachers staffed at the beginning of the year versus the number of students who remain in classrooms during second semester; health and welfare benefits; alternative plan to reduce District support and increase employee contributions;
- What are the savings in transportation costs for the five magnet programs (parents would transport)?
- GASB 45: reduce funding amount (i.e., 25% vs. 50%) and utilize funds now and/or establish a "trust".
- Staffing: Reduce staff and restructure the Central District office; the percentage of staff reduction should be equitable to each group (Certificated and Classified, Management)

The Board recessed at 6:59 p.m. and reconvened at 7:13 p.m.

2. Public Comment—Closed Session -- None

3. Public Comment—Agendized Items

Rick Feinstein, MAC representative, encouraged the Administration, Board, ACE, and CSEA to continue to work together to solve the budget problems with dignity and strength, and thanked the Superintendent for his leadership.

Ken Johnson, ACE President, stated that the correct amount is \$5.9 million and asked the Board to keep budget cuts away from classroom. He added that the cuts the District must make do not impact step and column increases, savings can result through attrition, encouraged spending reserves, and is grateful that GASB funds can be utilized so that positions are not reduced. Regarding the Budget Committee, he felt that the additional information presented should have been shared with the Committee. He suggested that if the Golden Handshake is approved, that it be paid over 7-8 years rather than all at once.

Lynn Mary Toscano, teacher/librarian at Bloomington Middle School, spoke about the importance of libraries and librarians as co-teachers. She distributed a research study illustrating that school libraries do make a difference.

Board President Armenta thanked the staff and parents for attending the meeting and making the presentation.

It was moved by Mr. Albiso and seconded by Mr. Zamora <u>to reject</u>. Resolution 08-03, *California State Teachers' Retirement System* (CalSTRS) Golden Handshake Retirement Incentive Program (2007-08) as presented, and on a 7-0 vote, the motion passed.

Board member Albiso stated that the District cannot afford the \$7.1 million cost and a savings could result by realigning current staff. Following discussion and by Board consensus, %the Administration with continue with strategies to balance the budget with a possibility that this item may be re-submitted if necessary.

Study, Information and Review Session

Explanation of the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) Golden Handshake Retirement Incentive Program (2007-08): Assistant Superintendent Casey Cridelich reviewed the multi-step process. Following discussion and by Board consensus, additional information was requested regarding this program and the feasibility of offering 2½ % at age 55 for classified employees.

<u>Closed Session</u>: At 7:43 p.m., Board President Armenta announced that the Board would recess to Closed Session to discuss agendized items: personnel, real property issues, anticipated litigation, labor negotiators

The Board reconvened at 8:56 p.m. and President Armenta stated that there was no reportable action.

Comments / Requests from Board Members

Mark Hoover suggested that a "thank you" letter be forwarded to the Fontana Police Department for transporting "Cat in the Hat" to the Zimmerman Elementary School campus on *Read Across America Day*.

David Zamora commented on his recent visits to Zimmerman and Birney Elementary Schools to participate in *Read Across America Day (Dr. Seuss)* and thanked the administration for inviting him to the event. Board members Frank Ibarra and Mark Hoover also participated.

Kent Taylor commented on his attendance at the District Science Fair last week and applauded teacher and advisor Dan Morris and Pat Haro for extending participation by kindergarten students in this year's competition.

Frank Ibarra commented on the events he attended at Zimmerman and Lincoln schools.

Robert Armenta attended the District Science Fair award ceremony and thanked advisor Dan Morris and Pat Haro for organizing an outstanding event. He especially enjoyed listening to the students explain their projects.

follows:

Pursuant to Education Code Section 42131, twice each year, the Board of Education must certify to the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools (SBCSS) that the District can meet its financial obligations for the current (2007-08) and two subsequent fiscal years (2008-09 and 2009-10).

The Second Interim Financial Report presents actual to date data as of January 31, 2008. This report must be approved and certified as positive, qualified, or negative by the Governing Board and submitted to the SBCSS by March 15, 2008. The three certifications are defined as

1. **Positive Certification** means that the District <u>will</u> meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

- 2. **A Qualified Certification** means that the District <u>may not</u> meet its financial obligations for the current or two subsequent fiscal years.
- 3. A Negative Certification means that the District will not meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year or for the subsequent fiscal year this means actually running out of cash.

On March 13, 2008, a qualified certification was proposed due to required reserve falling below 3% in 2009-10. At that time the Board directed staff to seek School Services of California input and reevaluate the District financial status. As a result, multi-year projections have been revised by ceasing the Annual Required Contribution (\$2.7M) that funds the retiree benefits, commencing in 2008-09. As a result, the District can now meet its required 3% reserves through 2009-10 and the 2007-08 Second Interim Report is now positive.

On January 10, 2008 the Governor declared a fiscal emergency. Per the SBCSS, districts must prepare their Second Interim Reports with the Governor's proposed assumptions. The following narrative portion of this report explains the changes to the District's General Fund as a result of the Governor's proposed budget, when comparing the Board Approved Operating Budget (as of January 31, the end of the first seven months) and the Projected Year Totals (as of March 20).

Also included, is a multi-year projection for the fiscal years 2008-09 and 2009-10. The multi-year projection is based on the listed assumptions for revenues, expenditures, staffing and enrollment. The below recap is a summary of the one time sources used to cover the projected deficit spending. The projected deficit spending is the result of NO BUDGET REDUCTIONS being implemented except for ceasing the abovementioned Annual Required Contribution to the Retiree Benefits Fund.

In summary, the District is able to make its 3% reserve in the budget and two future years by using \$20,222,603 (sum of the above) One Time Sources to cover the projected future deficit spending beginning in 2008-09. Additionally, the Budget Committee's recommendations will be brought forward to the April 17, 2008, Board meeting to review and possibly approve; thus reducing the reliance on one-time sources.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS:

Financial information presented for this Second Interim Report indicates that the <u>combined restricted and unrestricted</u> General Fund balance at June 30, 2008 is projected at \$26,960,762 million; \$22,503,980 million in 2008/09 and \$11,554,022 million in 2009/10.

EXPENDITURES:

Expenditure categories have been evaluated and adjusted accordingly to reflect projected balances as of June 30. The significant change is in the area of Books and Supplies in the amount of \$4.7 million. This is mainly due to review of the categorical programs to estimate unspent balances by June 30th. Per Board's direction, the District makes total categorical budgets available to program directors during the year. At this time it is projected approximately \$4.4 million will be remaining by the end of the year and as a result Books and Supplies category has been adjusted to reflect this projection. The District also has the practice of reviewing payroll encumbrances monthly to make necessary adjustments and liquidate budget.

Certificated Salaries – Decrease of \$2,456,875 mainly due to adjusting payroll encumbrances for contract salaries and stipends through June 30th, freeze hiring vacant positions till July 1st, and adjustments for categorical programs.

Classified Salaries – Decrease of \$1,212,178 mainly due to adjusting payroll encumbrance for contract salaries through June 30th, freeze of hiring vacant positions till July 1st, and adjustments for categorical programs.

Employee Benefits – Decrease of \$832,468 mainly due to adjusting payroll encumbrance and categorical programs.

Books and Supplies – Decrease of \$4,667,515 mainly as a result of reducing categorical program budget for the projected balances at June 30th and also 50% reduction to site and department budgets for mid-year cuts.

Services and Other Operating Expenditures – Increase of \$8,182 due to categorical programs.

Capital Outlay – Decrease of \$3,580 in unrestricted programs.

Other Outgo – Decrease of \$145,674 as result of \$33,964 increase in Community Day School fees to the County and reduction of \$179,638 in debt service.

ENDING FUND BALANCE AND MAJOR CHANGES TO THE COMPONENTS

Ending Fund Balance – It is projected that by year end the General Fund ending fund balance is projected at \$26,960,762 General Fund's ending balance includes reverses that are legally restricted, designations, and state mandated reserve for economic uncertainties:

Legally Restricted Balance – Restricted programs are projected to have an ending balance of \$4.4 million. District's practice is to budget for full entitlements during the year and make funds available to program directors. At this time, Books and Supplies expenditure category has been reduced to reflect the projected ending balance in these programs by June 30, 2008.

Designated for Future Operational Budget – \$7.5 million is harvested in 2007/08 and set aside to balance 2008/09 budget. This amount reflects one-time savings from freezing expenditures and delay hiring positions currently vacant in the District till July; payroll and benefit encumbrances adjustments projecting expenditures through June 30; site and department remaining balances at 50% for mid-year cuts; increase of \$1.7 million in Revenue Limit as a result of June Deferral calculation and \$500,000 increase in projected Interest Income:

Other Funds

Fund 11 – Adult Education Fund

Interest Income is increased by \$1,000. Fund balance is projected at \$9,946.

Fund 12 - Child Development Fund

Head Start revenues and expenditures are increased in the amount of \$3,464. Facility Use expenditures are decreased by \$13,650. Fund balance is projected at \$374,867.

Fund 13 – Nutrition Services Fund

No significant changes are noted at this reporting period. Fund balance is projected at \$1,185,186.

Fund 14 – Deferred Maintenance Fund

Ending fund balance at June 30, 2008 is projected at \$2,351,738.

Fund 17 - Special Reserve for Other than Capital Outlay Fund

Fund balance is projected at \$3,410,445. This fund balance is used to meet the District's 5% minimum reserve balance.

Fund 21 – Building Fund

Interest Income and Capital Outlay expenditures are increased by \$22,102. Fund balance is projected at \$42,247,974. These Funds are designated for the completion of the High School #3.

Fund 25 – Capital Facilities Fund

Fund balance is projected at \$10,740,869.

Fund 35 – School Facility Fund

Interest income and Capital Outlay expenditures are increased by \$12,000. Fund balance is projected at \$12,742,585.

Fund 40 - Special Reserve for Capital Outlay Fund

Fund balance is projected at \$5,677,743 and is comprised of prior years transfers in from General Fund and Nutrition Services. General Fund portion is used as one-time funds to balance the 2008/2009 budget.

Fund 51 – Bond Interest and Redemption Fund

No significant changes are noted at this reporting period. Fund balance is projected at \$7,098,198.

Fund 67 – Self Insurance Fund

Interest Income is increased by \$104,708. Fund balance is projected at \$15,881,807. Reserves in this fund are designated for payments of insurance claims.

Fund 94 – Community Facilities District (CFD) #2

Fund balance is projected at \$1,429,034. Reserves in this fund are designated for debt service on CFD #2.

Assumption for Multi-Year Projections 2007-08 through 2009-10

The Multi-year budget presented with the 2nd. Interim Financial Report is based on the most upto-date information available as of February 2008 and based on the following assumptions:

Enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA)

The District is in a declining enrollment status and projects that this trend will continue through 2009/10. The District's multi-year projections are based on a decline of 99 students in 2008/09 and 23 in 2009/10. Prior-Year guarantee allows districts to calculate revenue limit based on the high attendance count of current year or one prior year.

Revenues

Revenue Limit base is increased in each year by the projected Cost-of-Living-Adjustment (COLA) as reported by the School Services of California. 4.53% COLA is used to calculate the 2007/08 Revenue Limit, 4.94% in 2007/08, and 3% in 2008/09. However, a 6.99% deficit factor is applied to the Revenue Limit in 2008/09 and 2009/10 as a result of anticipated budget shortfalls. No Equalization is projected on the Revenue Limit during the next two years. Federal Revenues are maintained at constant.

Other State Revenues are increased by COLA in 2008/09 and reduced by the projected deficit factor resulting in a net decrease of 6.5%. Special Education revenues however are not allocated COLA and in addition will be cut approximately \$30 per ADA. Although Special Education is a restricted program it impacts unrestricted general fund, since it is an encroaching program.

Other Local Revenues are decreased slightly for interest income as a result of Governor's proposal to defer June apportionment funding to the month of September.

Expenditures

<u>Certificated and Classified Salaries</u> are projected with an increase for the cost of step and column in the 2008/09 and 2009/10. No other increases are projected.

Employee Benefits are projected based on projected salary increases as indicated above. In addition, health and welfare cost is projected to increase by 10% each year. The District provides 100% paid medical and dental to the permanent active employees and 100% paid medical benefits for its retired employees. CSEA employees hired after 7/1/06 and management employees hired after 9/1/07 receive 100% paid medical and dental of the lowest cost HMO. Statutory Benefits for certificated employees is projected at 11.55% for all three years. This is comprised of 8.25% State Teachers' Retirement System (STRS), 1.45% Medicare, 1.8% Worker's Compensation, and .05% State Unemployment Insurance.

Statutory Benefits for classified employees is projected at 22.52% for all three years. This is comprised of 13.02% for Public Employees Retirement System (District and state contribution), 6.2% Federal Insurance Contribution Act (FICA), 1.45% Medicare, 1.8% Worker's Compensation, and .05% State Unemployment Insurance.

2007/08 is the final payment of \$497,000 for Supplemental Employee Retirement Plan (SERP)

The District will cease GASB 45 contributions starting in 2008/09 to meet minimum required reserve and file a positive 2nd Interim Report.

<u>Books and Supplies</u> are adjusted in the Multi-year budget based on enrollment changes. The primary portion of these expenditures takes place from Federal and State funds (categoricals) specifically allocated for this purpose. This expenditure category is adjusted for the estimated carryover balances in State entitlements.

<u>Services and Other Operating Expenses</u> are budgeted in the Multi-year with an increase based on California Consumer Price Index (CPI) of 2.8% in 2008/09 and 2.9% in 2009/10.

Transfers In/Out

In 2008/09 fund 40 reserve balance of \$4.82 million will be transferred back to the General Fund to maintain 5% reserve requirement for Economic Uncertainties.

Reserves

<u>Economic Uncertainty Reserve</u> is set at 5% of the District's budget per Board Policy. Combined total unrestricted and undesignated reserve amount in the General Fund and Fund 17 provides for 8.30% reserve 2008/2009 and 4.76% reserve in 2009/2010.

Designated for Future Operational Budget is \$504,694 set aside to balance 2009/2010 budget.

<u>Unappropriated Reserve</u> is the amount available after the required set aside for Economic Uncertainties and other designations. The District's Multi-year projections show a zero Unappropriated Reserve balance in 2007/08 through 2009/10.

Fiscal Recovery Plan

The District recognizes the impending budget challenges and has established a \$10.2 million targeted budget realignments. Per Board instructions, a Budget Committee comprised of all stakeholders is formed to meet weekly. Budget Committee recommendations are communicated to the Board to identify areas of reduction for final implementation in 2008/09 adopted budget.

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COMPREHENSIVE LOCAL PLAN FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

BP 0430

The Governing Board desires to provide a free appropriate public education to all individuals with disabilities, aged 3 to 21 years, who reside in the district, including children who have been suspended or expelled or placed by the district in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school.

Students shall be referred for special education instruction and services only after the resources of the regular education program have been considered, and where appropriate, utilized. (Education Code 56303)

The special education local plan area (SELPA) shall administer a local plan and administer the allocation of funds. (Education Code 56195)

In order to meet the needs of individuals with disabilities and employ staff with adequate expertise for this purpose, the district participates as a member of the East Valley Special Education Local Plan Area (EVSELPA).

The Superintendent or designee shall extend the district's full cooperation to the EVSELPA. The policies and procedures of the EVSELPA shall be applied as policies and regulations of this district, with the exception of those that apply to complaints, unless the EVSELPA plan specifically authorizes the district to operate under its own policies and regulations.

The special education local plan area shall administer a local plan and administer the allocation of funds. (Education Code 56195)

TRANSPORTATION FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

BP 3541.2

The Governing Board shall ensure that appropriate transportation services are provided for students with disabilities as specified in their individualized education program (IEP) or accommodation plan. The district shall make home-to-school transportation available for students at no cost to parents/guardians as specified in the student's IEP.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish criteria and procedures for determining the most appropriate mode of transportation for an individual student based on identified needs as determined in the IEP or accommodation plan.

The Superintendent or designee shall arrange transportation schedules so that students with disabilities do not spend an excessive amount of time on buses compared to other students. Arrivals and departures shall not reduce the length of the school day for these students except as may be prescribed on an individual basis.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures to ensure compatibility between mobile seating devices and bus securement systems.

BACKGROUND: The administration is in the process of updating board policies and

administrative regulations under the guidance of the California School

Board Association.

ABSENCES AND EXCUSES

BP 5113

The Governing Board believes that regular attendance plays an important role in student achievement. The Board recognizes its responsibility under the law to ensure that students attend school regularly. Parents/guardians of children aged 6 to 18 are obligated to send their children to school unless otherwise provided by law. The Board shall abide by all state attendance laws and may use appropriate legal means to correct the problems of excessive absence or truancy.

Excused Absences

Absence from school shall be excused only for health reasons, family emergencies and justifiable personal reasons, as permitted by law, Board policy and administration regulations. (Education Code 46010, 48216, 48205)

Inasmuch as class participation is an integral part of students' learning experiences, parents/guardians and students shall be encouraged to schedule medical appointments during nonschool hours.

At the beginning of each academic year, notifications shall be sent to the parents/guardians of all students, and to all students in grades 7 through 12, informing them that school authorities may excuse any student from school to obtain confidential medical services without the consent of the student's parent/guardian. (Education Code 46010.1)

Student absence for religious instruction or participation in religious exercises away from school property may be considered excused subject to law and administrative regulations. (Education Code 46014)

A student's grades may be affected by excessive unexcused absences in accordance with Board policy.

ATTENDANCE AND ABSENCES

STUDENTS

8130

The state attendance laws require regular school attendance and punctuality with both the school and the parents having a responsibility for enforcing these laws. It has been well demonstrated that regular attendance is a key factor in the success a student achieves at school. The state law also requires that the school keep an accurate record of each student s attendance. A student should not be absent from school without the parents' knowledge and consent, and students will be allowed to be absent from school only for health reasons or in the case of a family emergency. Verification of absence can be verbal or written as specified in the Education Code.

The Superintendent shall establish such procedures as deemed necessary to determine the causes of habitual truancy, including medical verification for excessive absence, and cooperate with other private and governmental agencies in correcting the causes thereof. (State Department of Education Attendance Accounting in California Public Schools)

The Board shall establish and appoint members to a School Attendance Review Board (S.A.R.B.) as authorized by the Education Code.

ABSENCES

If absence from school is to be considered excused, a principal or teacher may require a satisfactory explanation from a parent of a student, either in person, by phone, or by written note. Upon returning to school after being absent, the student shall be permitted to return to class. The administration will determine whether absences are excused or unexcused.

JUSTIFIABLE ABSENCES

The Board directs that "justifiable absences" under the Education Code Section 48205 shall be granted only for comparable short-term absences, and that they shall not be granted for such purposes as traveling with parents on a vacation or business trip, nor for early starts or late returns from such trips.

EXCOSED ABSENCES

Students receive an excused absence when they are absent from school for the following reasons:

- Death in the immediate family (1 day in state, 3 days out-of-state).
- 2. Serious illness of a member of the family which necessitates the absence of the student.

EXCUSED ABSENCES - Continued

- 3. Illness or injury of the student.
- 4. Justifiable personal reasons, including but not limited to, an appearance in court, observance of a holiday or ceremony of his or her religion, or an employment interview, and such other absences as the principal may consider justifiable when requested in advance. (See "Justifiable Absences" above).

Students who plan to be absent for reasons other than the first three listed above should seek approval by presenting a note from home to the principal or administrator in charge of attendance, who will then indicate approval or disapproval. Any student shall be allowed to complete all assignments and tests missed during an excused absence that can reasonably be provided, and on completion shall be given full credit.

The teacher of any class from which a student has an excused absence shall determine what assignments the student shall make up and in what period of time the student shall complete such assignments. Tests and assignments may be the same as those missed, or shall be reasonably equivalent to them as set forth in the Education Code.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

Unexcused absences are those which do not come under any of the definitions of excused absences. Students who have unexcused absences may be denied make-up privileges. Such absences may be reflected in the student's final grade.

TRUANCY

Any student subject to compulsory full-time education or to compulsory continuation education who is absent from school without a valid excuse more than three days in one school year is a truant and shall be reported to the District Coordinator of Attendance or the Superintendent as defined in the Education Code.

When a student is first classified as a truant, the District shall notify the student's parents by first class mail or other reasonable means:

- That the student is truant.
- 2. That the parents are obligated to compel the student to attend.
- 3. That parents who fail to meet this obligation may be guilty of an infraction of the law and subject to prosecution. (EC 48291)

TRUANCY - Continued

The District will also inform the parents of:

- 1. Alternative educational programs available in the District.
- 2. Their right to meet with appropriate school personnel to discuss solutions to the student's truancy.

The Superintendent will develop specific regulations necessary to insure compliance.

TARDINESS TO CLASS

Continued tardiness on the part of any student will be viewed as a very serious matter. Promptness to class is extremely important. Students are expected to be in their places, ready for work at the bell or specified time. (See truangy above.)

REQUEST FOR EARLY DISMISSAL

Permission may be granted by the principal or designee according to each individual case.

ABSENCES AND EXCUSES

Excused Absences

A student's absence shall be excused for the following reasons:

- 1. Personal illness (Education Code 48205)
- 2. Quarantine under the direction of a county or city health officer (Education Code 48205)
- 3. Medical, dental, optometric, or chiropractic appointment (Education Code 48205)
- 4. Attendance at funeral services for a member of the immediate family, which shall be limited to one day if the service is conducted in California or three days if the service is conducted out of state. (Education Code 48205)

Immediate family shall be defined as mother, father, grandmother, grandfather, spouse, son/son-in-law, daughter/daughter-in-law, brother, sister, or any relative living in the student's immediate household. (Education Code 45194, 48205)

- 5. Jury duty in the manner provided by law (Education Code 48205)
- 6. The illness or medical appointment during school hours of a child to whom the student is the custodial parent (Education Code 48205)
- 7. Upon advance written request by the parent/guardian and the approval of the principal or designee, justifiable personal reasons including, but not limited to: (Education Code 48205)
 - a. Appearance in court
 - b. Attendance at a funeral service
 - c. Observation of a holiday or ceremony of his/her religion
 - d. Attendance at religious retreats not to exceed four hours per semester
 - e. Attendance at an employment conference
 - f. Attendance at an educational conference on the legislative or judicial process offered by a nonprofit organization
- 8. Service as a member of a precinct board for an election pursuant to Elections Code 12302 (Education Code 48205)

9. Participation in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction in accordance with district policy (Education Code 46014)

- a) In such instances, the student shall attend at least the minimum school day.
- b) The student shall be excused for this purpose on no more than four days per school month.

Method of Verification

When a student who has been absent returns to school, he/she shall present a satisfactory explanation verifying the reason for the absence. Absences shall be verified by the student's parent/guardian, other person having control of the minor, or the student if age 18 or older. (Education Code 46012; 5 CCR 306)

The following methods may be used to verify student absences:

- 1. Written note, fax, or email from parent/guardian or parent representative.
- 2. Conversation, in person or by telephone, between the verifying employee and the student's parent/guardian or parent representative. The employee shall subsequently record the following:
 - a. Name of student
 - b. Name of parent/guardian or parent representative
 - c. Name of verifying employee
 - d. Date(s) of absence
 - e. Reason for absence
- 3. Visit to the student's home by the verifying employee, or any other reasonable method which establishes the fact that the student was absent for the reasons stated. The employee shall document the verification and include the information specified in item #2 above.
- 4. Physician's verification
 - a. When excusing students for confidential medical services or verifying such appointments, district staff shall not ask the purpose of such appointments but may contact a medical office to confirm the time of the appointment.
 - b. When a student has had 14 absences in the school year for illness verified by methods listed in #1-3 above, any further absences for illness shall be verified by a physician.

The Governing Board recognizes the need to identify and evaluate children with disabilities in order to provide them with the services required by law.

The district shall provide a free and appropriate public education to students who reside within the district and who are classified as disabled under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Such students shall receive regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet their individual educational needs as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students are met. (34 CFR 104.33)

Re-Word

The Governing Board recognizes the need to identify and evaluate children with disabilities in order to provide them with a free, appropriate public education. Under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, individuals with a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, including learning, are eligible to receive services and aids designed to meet their needs as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students are met.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish screening and evaluation procedures to be used whenever there is reason to believe that a student has a disability that limits his/her ability to attend or function at school.

To evaluate the student's eligibility under Section 504, the Superintendent or designee shall convene the Student Success Team (SST), a school site committee of professionals knowledgeable about the student's individual needs and school history, the meaning of evaluation data, and accommodation options. The student's parent/guardian shall be invited to participate on this committee.

Delete and Replace with new language

If the student is found to have a disability that requires services under Section 504, the SST shall develop a written accommodation plan for the student. Upon reviewing the nature of the disability and how it affects the student's education, the committee shall determine what modifications and/or special services and aids are needed. The student shall be educated with nondisabled students to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's individual needs.

The SST shall provide the parent/guardian with a written copy of the accommodation plan and notice of procedural safeguards guaranteed by law.

Definitions

Eligibility for services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 means a student has any of the following conditions: (34 CFR 104.3)

- 1. A physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities.
- 2. Has a record or history of such impairment.
- 3. Is regarded as having such impairment because he/she
 - a. Has a physical or mental impairment that does not substantially limit a major life activity but is treated by the district as having such a limitation (e.g., a student who has scarring, a student who walks with a limp)
 - b. Has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits a major life activity only as a result of the attitudes of others towards such impairment (e.g., a student who has scarring or disfigurement)
 - c. Has no physical or mental impairment but is treated by the district as having such an impairment (e.g., a student who tests positive with the HIV virus but has no physical effects from it)

Major life activities means functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, and working (34 CFR 104.3)

Examples of physical or mental impairments that may constitute disabling conditions under Section 504 if the substantially limit a major life activity may include, but not be limited to, diabetes; communicable diseases such as HIV/AIDS or asymptomatic carriers of the AIDS virus; tuberculosis; attention deficit disorder (ADD or ADHD); chronic asthma or severe allergies; physical disabilities such as spina bifida or hemophilia; and temporary disabilities depending on the anticipated length of the disability, the seriousness of the illness/injury, and the needs of the student (e.g., students injured in accidents or suffering short-term illnesses).

Physical or mental impairment means any of the following: (34 CFR 104.3)

- 1. Any physiological disorder or condition, cosmetic disfigurement, or anatomical loss affecting one or more of the following major body systems: neurological; muscoskeletal; special sense organs; respiratory, including speech organs; cardiovascular; reproductive; digestive; genito-urinary; hemic and lymphatic; skin; and endocrine.
- 2. Any mental or psychological disorder, such as mental retardation, organic brain syndrome, emotional or mental illness, and specific learning disabilities.

Referral, Identification, and Evaluation

- 1. Any student may be referred by a parent/guardian, teacher, other school employee, student success team, or community agency for consideration of eligibility as a disabled student under Section 504. This referral may be made to the principal or 504 coordinator.
- 2. Upon receipt of a referral for eligibility, the principal shall promptly convene a meeting of a multidisciplinary 504 tram to consider the referral and determine whether an evaluation of the students is appropriate.

This 504 team shall consist of a group of persons knowledgeable about the student, the meaning of the evaluation data, and the placement options. (34 CFR 104.3)

The team's determination shall be based on a review of the student's school records, including academic and non-academic areas of the school program; consultation with the student's teacher(s), other professionals, and the parent/guardian, as appropriate; and analysis of the student's needs.

3. If the team believes that a student needs or is believed to need special education or related services under Section 504, the district shall conduct an evaluation of the student prior to initial placement and before any significant change in placement. (34 CFR 104.3)

The district's evaluation procedures shall ensure that tests and other evaluation materials: (34 CFR 104.3)

- a. Have been validated and are administered by trained personnel in conformance with the instruction provided by the test publishers.
- b. Are tailored to assess specific areas of educational need and are not based solely on a single IQ score.
- c. Reflect aptitude or achievement or whatever else the tests purport to measure and do not reflect the student's impaired sensory, manual or speaking skills unless the test is designed to measure these particular deficits.
- 4. In interpreting evaluation data and making placement decision, the team shall draw upon information from a variety of sources, including aptitude and achievement tests, teacher recommendations, physical condition, social or cultural background, and adaptive behavior. The team shall also ensure that information obtained from all such sources is documented and carefully considered and that the placement decision is made in conformity with 34 CFR 104.34. (34 CFR 104.35)

IDENTIFICATION AND EDUCATION UNDER SECTION 504 - continued

Accommodation Plan and Placement

1. If, upon evaluation, a student is determined to be eligible for services under Section 504, the 504 team shall meet to develop a written accommodation plan which shall specify placement, accommodations, and supplementary aids and services necessary to ensure that the student receives a free appropriate public education.

The parents/guardians shall be invited to participate in the meeting and shall be given an opportunity to examine all relevant records.

- 2. If the 504 team, determines that no services are necessary for the student, the record of the committee's meeting shall reflect the identification of the students as a disabled person under Section 504 and shall state the basis for the decision that no special services are presently needed.
- 3. The student shall be placed in the regular educational environment, unless the district can demonstrate that the education of the student in the regular environment with the use of supplementary aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily. The student shall be educated with those who are not disabled to the maximum extent appropriate to his/her individual needs. (34 CFR 104.34)
- 4. The district shall complete the identification, evaluation, and placement process within a reasonable time frame.
- 5. A copy of the student's accommodation plan shall be kept in his/her student record. The student's teacher, and other staff who provide services to the student, shall be informed of the plan's requirements.

Review and Reevaluation

- 1. The 504 team shall monitor the progress of the student and the effectiveness of the student's plan to determine whether the services are appropriate and necessary and whether the student's needs are being met as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students. The team shall review the student's accommodation plan annually. In addition, the student's eligibility under Section 504 shall be reevaluated as least once every three years.
- 2. A reevaluation of the student's needs shall be conducted before any subsequent significant change in placement. (34 CFR 104.35)

Procedural Safeguards

Parents/guardians shall be notified in writing of all district decisions regarding the identification, evaluation, or educational placement of students with disabilities or suspected disabilities. Notifications shall include a statement of their right to: (34 CFR 104.36)

- 1. Examine relevant records
- 2. Have an impartial hearing with an opportunity for participation by the parents/guardians and their

counsel

3. Have a review procedure

Notifications shall also detail the parent/guardian's right to file a grievance with the school district over an alleged violation of Section 504 regulation; right to have an evaluation that draws on information from a variety of sources; right to be informed of any proposed actions related to eligibility and plan for services; right to receive all information in the parent/guardian's native language and primary mode of communication; right to periodic reevaluations and an evaluation before any significant change in program/service modifications; right to an impartial hearing if there is a disagreement with the school district's proposed action; right to be represented by counsel in the impartial hearing process; and right to appeal the impartial hearing officer's decision.

If a parent/guardian disagrees with the identification, evaluation, or educational placement of his/her child under Section 504, he/she may initiate the following procedures:

- 1. Within 30 days of receiving the accommodation plan, file a written complaint with the District's 504 Coordinator detailing his/her disagreement and request that the 504 team review the plan in an attempt to resolve the disagreement. This review shall be held within 14 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request and the parent/guardian shall be invited to attend the meeting at which the review is conducted.
- 2. If disagreement continues, request in writing that the Superintendent or designee review the plan. This review shall be held within 14 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, and the parent/guardian shall be invited to meet with the Superintendent or designee to discuss the review.
- 3. If disagreement continues, request in writing a Section 504 due process hearing. The request shall include:
 - a. The specific nature of the decision with which the parent/guardian disagrees
 - b. The specific relief the parent/guardian seeks
 - c. Any other information the parent/guardian believes pertinent

Within 10 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, the Superintendent or designee and 504 Coordinator shall select an impartial hearing officer. This 10-day deadline may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties.

To ensure impartiality, hearing officers shall not be employed by or under contract with the district in any capacity other than that of hearing officer and shall not have any professional or personal involvement that would affect their impartiality or objectivity in the matter.

Within 45 days of the selection of the hearing officer, the Section 504 due process hearing shall be conducted and a written decision mailed to all parties. This 45-day deadline may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties.

Any party to the hearing shall be afforded the right to:

- 1. Be accompanied and advised by counsel and by individuals with special knowledge or training related to the problems of students who are qualified as disabled under Section 504
- 2. Present written and oral evidence
- 3. Question and cross-examine witnesses
- 4. Receive written findings by the hearing officer

If desired, either party may seek a review of the hearing officer's decision by a federal court of competent jurisdiction.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district has taken appropriate steps to notify students and parents/guardians of the district's duty under Section 504. (34 CFR 104.32)

IDENTIFICATION AND EDUCATION UNDER SECTION 504

Eligibility

A disabled student eligible for services under Section 504 is one who (a) has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, including learning, (b) has a record of such an impairment, or (c) is regarded as having such an impairment. (34 CFR 104.3)

Major life activities are functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning and working. Examples of students with such impairments include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Students with a normal ability to learn but who have a mobility impairment
- 2. Students with a normal ability to learn academically but who require occupational or physical therapy in order to function physically
- 3. Students with emotional disabilities manifested by behavior problems which result in exclusion from classes or school

Indications of a possible disability that significantly interferes with learning include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Medical conditions such as severe asthma or heart disease
- 2. Temporary medical condition due to illness or accident
- 3. Poor or failing grades over a lengthy period of time

Referral and Identification Procedures

- 1. Any student may be referred by a parent/guardian, teacher, other certificated school employee or community agency for consideration of eligibility as a disabled student under Section 504. This referral should be made to the school site principal.
- 2. The SST shall promptly consider the referral and determine whether an evaluation under this procedure is appropriate. This determination shall be based on a review of the student's school records (including academic, social and behavioral records) and the student's needs. Students requiring evaluation shall be referred to appropriate evaluation specialists.
- 3. If a request for evaluation is denied, the SST shall inform the parents/guardians of this decision and of their procedural rights as described below.

Accommodation Plan

- 1. When a student is identified as disabled within the meaning of Section 504, the SST shall determine what services are necessary to ensure that the student's individual education needs are met as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students.
- 2. In making this determination, the SST shall consider all significant factors relating to the learning process for the student, including his/her adaptive behavior and cultural and language background. The evaluation may include, but is not limited to, classroom and playground observation, performance-based testing, academic assessment information, and data offered by the parent/guardian.
- 3. The parents/guardians shall be invited to participate in the SST meeting where services for the student will be determined and shall be given an opportunity to examine all relevant records.
- 4. The SST shall develop a written plan describing the disability and specifying the services needed by the student. A copy of this plan shall be kept in the student's cumulative file. The student's teacher and any other staff who provide services to the student shall be informed of the services necessary for the student, to the extent that they need to be informed in order to provide for the student in the school setting.
- 5. If the SST determines that no services are necessary for the student, the record of the committee's meeting shall reflect the identification of the student as a disabled person under Section 504 and shall state the basis for the decision that no special services are presently needed.
- 6. The disabled student shall be placed in the regular educational environment unless the district demonstrates that a more restrictive placement is required in order to meet the student's needs. The disabled student shall be educated with those who are not disabled to the maximum extent appropriate to his/her individual needs.
- 7. The parents/guardians shall be notified in writing of the final decision concerning services to be provided, if any, and of the Section 504 procedural safeguards, including the right to an impartial hearing to challenge the decision.
- 8. The district shall complete the identification, evaluation and placement process within a reasonable time frame.
- 9. The student's plan shall include a schedule for periodic review of the student's needs and indicate that this review may occur sooner at the request of the parent/guardian or school staff.

Review of the Student's Progress

1. The SST shall monitor the progress of the disabled student and the effectiveness of the student's plan. The committee shall periodically determine whether the services are

appropriate and necessary and whether the disabled student's needs are being met as adequately as the needs of nondisabled students.

2. A reevaluation of the student's needs will be conducted before any subsequent significant change in placement.

Procedural Safeguards

Parents/guardians shall be notified in writing of all district decisions regarding the identification, evaluation or educational placement of students with disabilities or suspected disabilities. Notifications shall include a statement of their rights to: (34 CFR 104.36)

- 1. Examine relevant records
- 2. Have an impartial hearing with an opportunity for participation by the parents/guardians and their counsel
- 3. Have a review procedure

Notifications shall also set forth the procedures for requesting a hearing, the name, address and telephone number of the person with whom the request should be made, and the fact that reimbursement for attorney's fees is available only as authorized by law.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a list of impartial hearing officers who are qualified and willing to conduct Section 504 hearings. To ensure impartiality, such officers shall not be employed by or under contract with the district in any capacity other than that of hearing officer and shall not have any professional or personal involvement that would affect their impartiality or objectivity in the matter.

If a parent/guardian disagrees with the identification, evaluation or educational placement of a student with disabilities under Section 504, he/she may initiate the following procedures:

- 1. Within 30 days of receiving the student's accommodation plan, set forth in writing his/her disagreement and request that the school principal and SST review the plan in an attempt to resolve the disagreement. This review shall be held within 14 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, and the parent/ guardian shall be invited to attend the meeting at which the review is conducted.
- 2. If disagreement continues, request in writing that the Superintendent or designee review the plan. This review shall be held within 14 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, and the parent/guardian shall be invited to meet with the Superintendent or designee to discuss the review.
- 3./If disagreement continues, request in writing a Section 504 due process hearing. The request shall include:
 - a. The specific nature of the decision with which the parent/guardian disagrees
 - b. The specific relief the parent/guardian seeks

c. Any other information the parent/guardian believes pertinent

Within 20 days of receiving the parent/guardian's request, the Superintendent or designee shall select an impartial hearing officer. This 20 days may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties.

Within 45 days of the selection of the hearing officer, the Section 504 due process hearing shall be conducted and a written decision mailed to all parties. This 45 days may be extended for good cause or by mutual agreement of the parties. The Superintendent or designee shall represent the district at this hearing.

Any party to the hearing shall be afforded the right to:

- 1. Be accompanied and advised by counsel and by individuals with special knowledge or training related to the problems of students who are qualified as disabled under Section 504
- 2. Present written and oral evidence
- 3. Question and cross-examine witnesses
- 4. Receive written findings by the hearing officer

If desired, either party may seek a review of the hearing officer's decision by a federal court of competent jurisdiction.
